At work, Rita was always the one that brought her famous baked beans to parties and potlucks. She would donate treats or money for treats for all the important holidays for all of the folks Scott worked with to make sure everyone had something special. She and Scott especially liked to have special treats for everyone on Easter, Halloween, and Christmas and Valentine's Day which always enhanced the goody bags the staff would donate to as well. She was also famous for being the "candy lady" ♦, all the bus drivers loved her as she would give them, bags of candy (mostly good chocolates) in thanks to their service and caring for Scott.

When I would attend the various activities that Scott participated in with his friends, I had the opportunity to witness the depth of Rita's caring for others, and the mutual love they shared with her. Parents of Scott's friends, caregivers, bus drivers, and others enjoyed visiting with her and being in her company.

Before Rita moved back east, I found out my next door neighbor even knew Rita (small world) from the days that Rita bowled in leagues. Shan shared some fond memories of those days, and said that she has a recipe that Rita gave her for crab mousse. That was what Rita would bring to their annual potluck for the league, and Shan still makes it every year as it is so good. I know Rita loved bowling in her leagues as well and shared several fond memories of those days with me.

While I was working with Scott, I also had the opportunity to meet Rosemary, Rita's sister when she would come out west to visit. Rita always talked about her and her family and how she wished she could get back more often, and always enjoyed and looked forward to Rosemary's visits.
